# Meeting Minutes - from the secretary:

Mandy Martin-Sanchez called the May chapter meeting to order at 4:37 PM at East Jefferson. Mandy welcomed attendees and introduced Christopher Hudgins, a clinical specialist from 3M in the infection prevention division. Christopher explained how he started working in the OR as a surgical tech, went to nursing school and did travel nursing. Along the way he became an expert in normothermia. His presentation was titled, "Unintended Hypothermia: The Importance of Maintaining Normothermia" for one CE credit.

Christopher explained that having a core temperature of 98.6° F or 37° C is considered in the normothermic range. The periphery is usually 2° to 4° cooler. The body's defense against cold is the closing of the arteriovenous shunts in the periphery and shivering. The body "shunts" blood from the periphery when it's cold to protect itself. Hyperthermia is defined as having a temperature below 96.8° F or 36° C. The hypothalamus is the body's thermostat. Thermoreceptors are found in our skin, spinal cord, brain and deep central tissues. These thermoreceptors send signals to the brain to open or close the AV shunts.

Some common causes of perioperative hypothermia are cold operating rooms, exposed body cavities, cold infusion meds/blood, cold OR beds and using cold instruments. However, general anesthesia is most

common cause of unintended hypothermia. General anesthesia puts the hypothalamus to sleep, along with the rest of the body. Therefore, the body needs to get really cold or really hot before it responds to the change in temperature. The negative effects of hypothermia are increased wound infections, MI, cardiac disturbances, prolonged and altered drug effects, coagulopathy, increased mortality, shivering and thermal discomfort and delayed emergence from anesthesia requiring more time in PACU. Surgical site infections (SSI) are now the fourth largest killer in the US claiming more lives than AIDS, breast cancer and traffic accidents combined.

Some of the many benefits of warming the perioperative patient are reduced use of blood products, decreased time in PACU, shorter length of stay, decreased time in ICU, reduced SSI rate, decreased MI and lower mortality rates. Studies have shown that forced air warming is the most effective way to maintain normothermia. It's a method of active warming that has been around for over 20 years. Placing a warm blanket on a patient would be considered passive warming. Also, pre-warming the patient before general anesthesia administration provides the best results because it's easier to maintain a temperature than to try to play catch up. The AORN Guidelines recommend that patients are pre-warmed for 15 minutes before anesthesia Continued on page 6

administration. Forced air can "bank heat" in the periphery. When anesthesia is given, the warm blood in the periphery mixes with the warm blood of the core and the patient's temperature remains normothermic. Anesthesia staff typically pushes anesthesia meds as soon as the patient is on the OR bed. They don't want to wait 15 minutes to warm the patient. Unless preventative measures are taken, 50% -90% of patients will become hypothermic. Cotton blankets are not the answer for pre-warming a patient. Perioperative staff need to work together to keep surgery patients normothermic.

Mandy thanked Christopher for the informative presentation and started the business portion of the meeting. The minutes were sent out in the newsletter and published on the website. Mandy asked if there were any corrections to the minutes? No one had any changes and the minutes were approved as published.
